#### **BOARD OF ALDERMEN CHAMBERS**

Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen of  
the Board, distinguished guests.

I am very pleased to have the  
opportunity this morning to address you on  
the State of the City. I believe you are among  
the best group of aldermen that I've seen in  
my time at City Hall.

I look forward to working with you to  
continue our progress making St. Louis a great  
City.

St. Louis, more than other places, is a city of neighborhoods. We are passionately attached to our homes, our own blocks, and the blocks around our homes that make up each of our neighborhoods.

We value history and tradition. We like change, but we expect it to be gradual and always for the better. Our new cathedral was built in 1907 -- but we still have the old one, just in case things don't work out.

We love the familiar bricks and stones of our homes and public buildings. We know the alleys like we know our own hallways. We are proud of the park, the school, the library, or the monument up the street from our homes.

We think of the street lights, the dumpsters, and the stop signs -- particularly the stop signs -- as our very own. We love our families, and very often, the meaning of "family" extends to those who are our neighbors.

This passion for our own neighborhoods is one of the City's greatest strengths.

More so than people in newer cities or the suburbs, we share an enthusiasm with our neighbors for the places we live, and we count on the cooperation of our neighbors to get things done.

Our City neighborhoods, nearly 80 of them in all, are as different from each other as places to live can be. This diversity, too, is one of our City's enduring strengths.

In the two years since I was elected mayor, I have made improving the quality of life in our neighborhoods the focus of my work.

As someone who has lived most of his life in the same neighborhood in which he grew up, I know what it takes to make a strong neighborhood.

A good neighborhood needs reasons to believe that things are getting better, not worse.

We need reason to believe that our families are safe.

We need reassurance that our properties are increasing in value, not decreasing.

We need places to walk, and play, and exercise. Places to park. Places to shop. Places to eat. Places to learn. Places to pray. Places to meet our neighbors.

And, we need the sorts of investment in infrastructure that keep our neighborhoods looking well-maintained.

As proof of what I say, one need look no further than this Board. In any other city, your duties would be different -- and your phones would ring less.

In St. Louis, though, the love of our neighborhoods keeps each of you -- and the rest of city government -- busy answering the thousands of calls and requests that our neighbors have concerning the smallest-- and biggest-- things in their neighborhoods.

When I ran for this job, I had a plan to improve the quality of life in our neighborhoods. That plan has five major components:

1. Improved neighborhood services
2. Reduced crime
3. Better schools
4. Integrity and efficiency in City government, and
5. Access to good jobs

When I became mayor, I asked every city department to treat taxpayers' hard-earned money carefully.

I asked the Departments to take on the tasks of improving city government, and bettering the quality of services provided to neighborhoods and to the people living in them. Protecting them. Keeping them strong and growing. Keeping them clean, and, most of all, making sure the neighborhoods remain the places that people want to settle into, make friends, raise families, and enjoy their lives.

I believe that we have been successful, and I can report to you today that the State of our City is strong.

Despite the economy, despite our fiscal challenges, crime is down. Property values are up.

The quality of life in neighborhood after neighborhood is improving.

There is four-and-a-half billion dollars worth of construction just finished, being built, or on the drawing board.

For the first time in a very long time, most people feel optimistic about the City's future.

As examples of our strength, I would like to talk to you today about my Neighborhood Life Initiatives -- a continuing series of programs to combat problems in neighborhoods head on-- providing manpower, law enforcement, planning, coordination, and legal support to address challenges in our neighborhoods.

The first Neighborhood Life Initiative I proposed was the Problem Properties Program.

I wanted this program to be first, because we all know that even one bad neighbor or landlord can undermine the efforts of every good person on the block.

Problem Properties was designed to identify the worst and most persistent offenders and force them to correct housing, building, and life/safety violations on their properties. We have dedicated three full-time police officers, a full-time staff of attorneys, a Problem Properties Court and judge, and the full attention of City government. Charles Bryson from my office has made Problem Properties, and the other Neighborhood Life Initiatives, his personal passion.

Thanks to Mr. Bryson and his team, problems such as derelict and abandoned buildings, slum landlords, overcrowded residences, and building code violations are being dealt with directly and forcefully.

And we are getting results.

Let me show you one example. [Over on the easel, is a "before" photograph of a property that was run-down for years.]

Now, let me show you the "after". As a result of the work of the problem property strike force, this house has been cleaned up, occupied and put back on the tax roles.

That is happening in neighborhoods throughout the City. We are holding people accountable for what they do to our neighborhoods.

Hundreds of property owners have been located by our task force and thousands of dormant and outstanding warrants have been served, and the City put a very stubborn housing scofflaw in jail for 33 days, where he was able to spend some time weighing the merits of following the housing code.

This program has shown phenomenal progress in improving our neighborhoods.

Everyone, except a slumlord or two, has been very pleased with the results.

I applaud City Counselor Patti Hageman, Steve Kovac, Public Safety director Sam Simon, and all the others responsible for making this effort such a success.

I want to report on our second Initiative: our Trash Task Force.

As anyone at the Citizen's Service Bureau will tell you, the City gets thousands of calls a year asking for help in cleaning up piles of trash, alleys choked with trash, vacant lots heaped with trash, and streets dotted with abandoned cars.

A regrettable, but familiar pattern has emerged in some neighborhoods. People dump trash, the City picks it up. They dump again, the City picks it up, and so on.

In the last year, the City picked up 5,000 tons of illegally dumped trash, costing taxpayers millions of dollars.

We are committed to breaking that cycle.

So, we have launched Clean Up St. Louis -- a vigorous program aimed at cracking down on illegal dumping and trash accumulation in our neighborhoods.

In the last two years:

1. More than 1,200 citations have been made for illegal dumping,
2. More than 100 arrests have been made for accumulated trash violations, and
3. 2,100 abandoned cars have been towed.

Neighbors are telling us that they're happy to see the trash go, and neighborhoods are looking better.

That improvement is, in no small measure, due to city employees doing their jobs -- and doing them well.

Over the past two years, living in City neighborhoods has become popular again.

Property values in the City are rising at more than double the rate of St. Louis County.

The number of people seeking residential building permits is on the rise.

The average price of a new home in the City has risen in the last two years by more than 20%.

Neighborhoods that have not seen new investment in decades are being brought back to life.

Two of the reasons for our neighborhoods' renaissance are in the chambers this morning: Police Chief Joe Mokwa and Fire Chief Sherman George. Both men are outstanding civil servants and good neighbors.

Even with the tough budget years, there are 100 more police officers on the streets today than one year ago.

As never before, there is a coordinated effort to crack down on crime, keeping my office, the St. Louis police department, United States Attorney Ray Gruender, and St. Louis Circuit Attorney Jennifer Joyce in touch with each other.

As a result, the homicide rate was down by 25% in 2002; and in the first quarter of this year, the homicide rate was down by 36%.

That did not happen by accident. I applaud Chief Mokwa and his outstanding officers' hard work and bravery.

The chief asked me point out for special mention several programs within the Police Department that are specifically targeting problems in neighborhoods with the highest crime rates.

According to police reports, 47% of all violent crimes occur in just 12 neighborhoods.

Chief Mokwa and his officers have given these neighborhoods some very special attention over the last two years. And they have made important progress in returning those neighborhoods back to the law-abiding, peaceful people who live there.

Would Officer Christine Fernandez, Lieutenant Jerry Leyschock, and Officer Ronnie Robinson please stand?

Officer Christine Fernandez, assigned to the Sixth District, is back on duty after being shot while trying to assist at the scene of a car accident in October 2002, when one of the parties involved pulled a gun and opened fire.

In her act of bravery, after having suffered life-threatening injuries, she was able to return fire, disabling the suspect until backup officers arrived.

Please join me in applauding Officer Christine Fernandez for her bravery in the line of duty.

Lieutenant Leyschock heads the Police Department's Housing Authority Unit, patrolling the City's public housing developments.

For too long, some public housing developments have been havens for people wanted for serious crimes, and places in which criminals felt safe selling narcotics, keeping weapons, trespassing, and chopping up stolen cars.

The focus of the Housing Authority Unit is to be as visible as possible, and to have positive interaction with the tenants.

Officers assigned to the Unit are committed to the law-abiding residents of public housing. They know that the results of effective public-housing policing are tangible, so they attend tenant meetings in the developments, and try to act on concerns of the residents.

Officers assigned to this Unit tell me that they are finally seeing their crime indicators lowering, and they are optimistic about the future of the neighborhoods in which they are patrolling.

Let's applaud the hard work of the officers of the Housing Authority Unit, and encourage them to keep up the good work they are doing in making neighborhoods safer places to live.

Sergeant Ronnie Robinson heads the Police Department's Gang Unit, responsible for monitoring the growth, development, movement and activities of gangs and their members.

These officers teach parents and teachers about the signs that young people are involved with gangs.

They also participate in the St. Louis Police Athletic League, coaching and coordinating sports teams and activities to develop personal relationships with children who are at high risk, to keep them from becoming involved with crime and gangs. It is high energy, emotionally draining, around-the-clock police work.

I'd like to applaud the work the Gang Unit officers are doing.

I know they put in more time to help these kids than ever shows up in their paychecks, and I congratulate them on their dedication to their jobs.

Finally, the Chief asked me to remind you about the Safe City web site, an online computer program that lets police and residents access neighborhood crime information. No other police website in the region -- or, even the country, shares as much information as ours does. It is another tool and innovation that will reduce crime in our City.

Circuit Attorney Jennifer Joyce believes the same thing.

The Circuit Attorney's Office has a new website that provides detailed information on the status of criminal cases in the city, including sentences, that can now be read online.

Taking advantage of technology will improve City government in many other ways. Imagine being able to track your request for service at the Citizen's Service Bureau... or applying for a permit or paying a parking ticket over the Internet.

Better services, delivered more quickly and more efficiently, lie ahead as we begin to implement the technology bill you passed earlier this year.

Another vital component of our neighborhoods is the work of Fire Department and Emergency Medical Service personnel.

Our Fire Department, under the expert command of Fire Chief Sherman George,

responds to 43,000 fire calls, and more than 68,000 EMS calls, each year, saving lives and property.

They do their dangerous jobs bravely, and well. If I introduced the Fire Department's heroes this morning, there would not be enough room for the rest of us, because every man and woman on that department is a hero. If I told all their stories, there would not be enough time to talk about anything else.

But, Chief George wanted me to introduce you to a Fire Department hero who doesn't own boots or a fire hat.

Mrs. Melanie Johnson is a Program Manager for the Fire Department's Emergency Medical Service's Billing Department. Mrs. Johnson, could you please stand?

Chief George wanted me to mention Mrs. Johnson, instead of himself, because he was proud of what she did. So, am I.

The books at EMS have always been a mess, and service has always outstripped payment.

Under Mrs. Johnson's supervision, new billing procedures have been initiated in EMS, including a credit card payment system. As a result of this new system and Mrs. Johnson's work, the City has collected an additional million dollars.

At a time when every dollar is needed to deliver high-quality services, that is worth a round of applause.

Continuing with the accolades for the Department of Public Safety, the City's new Justice Center was built on budget and opened on time.

It currently employs more than 240 staff members and has approximately 460 inmates. And, based on the fact that I haven't seen it on television lately, I can tell that everything is running smoothly.

Although our police officers and firefighters are the city's most visible public employees, there are thousands more men and women who also contribute to our neighborhoods by their timely patching, paving, pruning, planting, and repairing.

They are smarter and more innovative than city employees of only a decade ago. They are delivering their services faster and better. And, with the assistance of our CitiView program, we expect to continue to stretch each taxpayer dollar, helping our employees to work even better and faster.

Some of the City's most important amenities are its parks – green spaces that range in size from the magnificence of the

nearly restored Forest Park to tiny pocket parks and playgrounds that serve as points of neighborhood pride and enjoyment.

During the last two years, the Forestry Division has taken more than 60,000 service requests – roughly one-fourth of all requested city services.

Its employees have removed dangerous trees, maintained vacant and weed-filled properties, planted thousands of new saplings and young trees, distributed wood chips and mulch, and led the neighborhood battle against places mosquitoes could breed.

And, the renovation of eight park playgrounds throughout the city, including the installation of new playground equipment and rubberized surfaces, will make a lot of neighborhood children happy this summer.

The Refuse Division hauls away tons of trash from our neighborhood dumpsters and receptacles. Their work is excellent. In a customer survey, they were given an A.

But, it isn't often that we acknowledge them or their work. I would like to change that today.

Would Johnnie Edwards please stand?

While Mr. Edwards was on his route late last year, he saw two marauding dogs – pit bulls -- attacking a woman and her Dalmatian. Mr. Edwards immediately stopped his truck, jumped out, radioed for help, and, finally, used a 2-by-4 board to convince the dogs to release the woman and her dog.

Please join me in applauding Mr. Johnnie Edwards for an act of heroism well beyond his job description.

Few of the City's Charter responsibilities are as important – or have been more difficult to address – than the mandate to maintain public health.

At every level, health is a key component of stable neighborhoods: healthy kids stay in school; healthy parents go to work; and healthy people are vital contributors to our city.

For the first time in a very long time, a mayor can stand in front of you and report that the Health Department is healthier.

For the past 2 years, senior Health Department managers led by Health Commissioner Melba Moore, have worked to implement standard accounting policies and procedures, restoring the fiscal integrity to the Department and repairing relationships with various funding sources.

That effort is paying off. When I took office, the Missouri Health Director told me the City's Ryan White Title II grant was 95% out of compliance.

I am proud to report that a few weeks ago, the State of Missouri enthusiastically re-instated the St. Louis Health Department to administer the Ryan White funds again.

Under the leadership of Melba Moore and the Health Director, Dr. Hugh Stallworth, our health department is again becoming a leader in combating disease.

At their direction, the health department has:

1. Developed a strategic, comprehensive plan of attack on the West Nile mosquito outbreak in the area, spraying over 4,800 miles of St. Louis neighborhoods and treating more than a thousand mosquito infested sites last summer;
2. Developed a comprehensive childhood lead poisoning prevention program, screening over 28,000 children and removing lead paint hazards in more than 170 homes;
3. Developed a Sickle Cell Anemia donor match program, partnering with area churches;
4. Begun a new partnership with Saint Louis University that will improve the Health Department's professionalism and efficiency.

Its sister agency, the Department of Human Services is also improving. In the last year, they:

1. Won an \$8 million federal grant to provide housing and services for the area's homeless;
2. With the Housing Authority, launched the Bridge to Homeownership program that allows people to apply their federal housing vouchers to home purchases; and
3. Developed "Social Serve dot com", a website designed to help low-income families find affordable housing online, eliminating the need to make multiple phone calls and drive around the city to find places to live.

This is a time of new possibilities in the City of St. Louis.

We are seeing people and businesses coming back into our City.

We are seeing real progress in the fight against violent crime.

This is all good news.

But in order for all of these promising trends to become lasting realities – in order for St. Louis to live up to its vast potential as one of America's great cities – there is another step we must take.

We must give our children – all of our children – access to a good education, an education that prepares them for the complex challenges of the twenty-first century.

In order to achieve this, we must come together as a community to transform the St. Louis Public Schools.

We need to prepare our children so they have a real opportunity to pursue their dreams. We need to prepare our children for good-paying jobs and to be good citizens.

It has not been happening.

This step cannot be ignored. It cannot be skipped. It cannot be put off for another generation – or another year. It has already been put off for far too long. It must be taken now.

At a time when we are taking steps to rebuild our city's population base, we need excellent public schools that keep families in the city – and that attract new residents seeking the best education for their kids.

And at a time when we are doing everything in our power to open the doors of opportunity for all of our people, we need excellent public schools that will close the academic achievement gap – not only the gap between black students and white students, but the achievement gap between our public schools and the very best public schools in the United States.

Developing truly excellent public schools will not be easy. It will take time. It will take hard work. It will take a commitment from all parts of this diverse city.

But we must do it – and we can do it.

With Dr. Donald Suggs, members of the Black Leadership Roundtable, Civic Progress, the St. Louis Labor Council, the Regional Business Council, parents, and neighborhood activists, we formed the St. Louis Education Coalition.

Our mission is to produce dramatic improvement in the education of children.

Our first task was to elect four new school board members.

We have done that. Now, the real work lies ahead.

Progress in our schools means better prepared students, safer schools, stronger fiscal controls, better trained and paid teachers, higher graduation and attendance rates, and more kids getting good jobs or going on to college.

To support the new School Board's efforts:

1. I raised more than \$700,000 to launch Teach for America here a year ago, giving forty-one recent college graduates in the Teach for America program the opportunity to teach in urban schools, while giving our City's school children the opportunity to interact with bright, dedicated people from other cities around the country.

2. I campaigned for Proposition 1 to get the rest of our public schools air-conditioned, which city voters passed overwhelmingly a few weeks ago;

3. I asked Judge Bettye Battle-Turner to expand the Truancy Court. The goal of Judge Battle-Turner's court is to improve school attendance and performance at all schools.

Judge Battle-Turner gets parents involved in their children's schooling by holding them equally responsible for their children's truancy.

We have expanded the program from three cases prior to 2001, to more than 600 cases in the system now.

Judge Battle-Turner, could you please stand?

Let's give Judge Battle-Turner a hand for her dedication to the education of our children.

Employment opportunities are another important and obvious component of the success of our neighborhoods. Working people contribute to the City's economy, provide for their families, and contribute to the overall stability of their neighborhoods.

The St. Louis Agency on Training and Employment, SLATE, spearheaded a recruitment and training project for the new Renaissance Grand Hotel downtown, providing over 180 jobs for Empowerment Zone/Enterprise Community residents this past January.

The project was an overwhelming success, filling all the jobs requested by the hotel.

Last summer, SLATE provided jobs to more than 700 young people, placing most of them in jobs with private employers. The key to the success of this program is getting our kids real work experience—and getting employers to recognize that city kids can be great workers.

We hope to do even better this summer.

Today, more people are coming to see St. Louis as a great place to do business.

Thanks to everyone here and the hard-working staff at the City's development agencies, we are changing attitudes about the City's future—and more and more people are choosing the City as the place they want to live, work or build a business.

Four great new directors now lead our City's development agencies: Rodney Crim at SLDC—Kathy Brown at CDA—Rollin Stanley at the Planning and Urban Design Agency—and Tom Jones at SLATE. These new directors have made these agencies teem with new life and new capacity. Together with Barbara Geisman of my staff, they make up the most talented neighborhood and business development team in the state.

Much of the public's attention on the City's last two years has been focused on big developments: the opening of the Renaissance Grand Hotel; the opening of the Homer G. Phillips Senior Living complex; the completion of the public part of the packaging for a new Cardinals ballpark and Ballpark Village; the Old Post Office development and Grand Center.

But the City has actually spent far more effort, and attracted much less attention, on hundreds of development initiatives in all parts of the City.

And more and more developers are viewing the City as a place to build success.

Conrad Properties, a premier St. Louis County developer, has chosen to develop new housing on Forest Park Boulevard and in Lafayette Square. And they have more City projects on the drawing board...

Koman Properties, a premier regional retail developer, has chosen to build a new shopping center at Grand Avenue and Dr. Martin Luther King Boulevard. Koman, too, wants to do more.

Kimco, a Chicago developer, has invested millions of dollars in the reconstruction of a shopping plaza at Gravois and Gustine.

With Alderwoman Flowers at the helm, we are focused on making the Baden Business District an attractive entryway to the Baden neighborhood—and an attractive entryway to the new riverfront trail.

We continue to develop our potential to create new technology companies and jobs through technology incubators like the Center for Emerging Technologies and the newly created Technology Entrepreneur Center downtown. I am happy to welcome Global Velocity to downtown St. Louis - the first company being developed in the Technology Entrepreneur Center.

And I am happy to report that under the leadership of John Dubinsky, the Danforth Foundation, SLU and BJC, the Technopolis project is now moving forward to keep these growing new life sciences and technology businesses right here in the City of St. Louis.

Mary "One" Johnson has launched a development business and is building new homes throughout the City—in St. Louis Place, in the Gate District, and in the Ville.

Tony Thompson has bought a building on Washington Avenue—after completely rehabilitating the structure, he has moved his business, Kwame Construction, from Clayton to downtown St. Louis and produced loft living space in the process.

Thanks to Alderman Mike McMillan, Alderman Lewis Reed, Cheryl Lovell of the Housing Authority, John Steffen and McCormack Baron, a new Blumeyer HOPE VI is now underway—and the Darst Webbe Hope VI is almost completed. And the long-awaited rehabilitation of City Hospital will begin this summer.

Martin Jaffe, Arthur El-Amin and Bank of America are all building new market rate housing north of Delmar—and selling these homes for what it costs to build them.

House by house, block by block, it is becoming more difficult to ignore a budding renaissance of the neighborhoods of North St. Louis.

These new homes—and new and rehabilitated homes throughout the City—form the basis for a retail market that is as yet untapped.

I've been meeting regularly with the region's retail developers—all of whom view the City a great retail market for the future.

As we complete the land use plan that we've been working on with all of you aldermen, we will have sites throughout the City where new retail development can occur.

And we're also working on new sites for industrial development. On the North Riverfront, in Alderwomen Phyllis Young's, April Ford-Griffin's and Dionne Flowers' wards, we will soon have a plan for new business parks—so that the many businesses who want to be in the city but need 15-acre sites have places to go.

The plan will also identify sites for new subdivisions—so that the multitude of regional homebuilders who now want to do business in our City have places to do their work.

And the plan will identify neighborhoods throughout the City that are attractive and unique, where we want to preserve what's there and build on its attractiveness.

I'm working hard to keep the businesses we have—and to attract new businesses to our City. I personally visit with businesses that are thinking about leaving the City—and I personally visit with businesses that are contemplating a relocation within our boundaries. Knowing that a Mayor cares what they do has changed their attitudes as well.

And most of these businesses truly appreciate what the City has to offer—great transportation, unique living and workspace, exciting and lively entertainment options—and most of all a city government that cares.

While we are working hard on new development, we are also focused on the preservation and rehabilitation of our unique and attractive historic structures.

In Alderman Reed's Tower Grove East neighborhood, we've embarked on the Rehab-a-Rama—a concentrated effort to rehabilitate and market the vacant and underutilized historic structures in this neighborhood. I'm happy to report that every city-owned building in this area is now in the hands of a developer or a homeowner actively working on its rebirth.

We are working with other aldermen on the creation of new historic districts that can take advantage of state and federal historic tax credits—a unique development incentive that has spurred millions of dollars in construction work in the City of St. Louis since 1997.

And we are working very hard, with the Landmarks Association, with the Downtown Partnership, and with local developers to preserve the state historic tax credit, an essential program that was threatened this year in the state's budget crisis.

I am confident that with the coalition we have built we will succeed.

Teamwork is the key to city development—and teamwork is the key to the City's future. During the past two years, I've focused a lot of energy on building new teams.

We now have a team that is working together to rebuild downtown St. Louis. I thank Peter Sortino of St. Louis 2004, Tom Reeves of Downtown Now! and Jim Clour and John Dubinsky of the Downtown St. Louis Partnership for their willingness to work with us as partners to launch and complete major projects—and to address the issues that a complex neighborhood like downtown faces every day.

We now have teams throughout the City that are working together to rebuild our neighborhoods—city staff, Aldermen, developers and neighborhood residents.

We now have teams throughout the City who are working together to attract new business, to keep the business we have—and to let everyone know that the City is a great place to work. I thank Don Woehle in particular for his unstinting marketing of downtown.

We now have teamwork with most members of this Board of Aldermen. We know that you are our partners and that together we can succeed. We are all—throughout City government—focused on getting things done. This, too, is a new attitude in City government.

My administration is also committed to including everyone in our prosperity, in creating real opportunities for all people, not just sham chances and simple window dressing.

To make that possible, we streamlined the minority certification process to reduce the hassle for legitimate minority companies. What used to take a year and a lot of money has been reduced to 60 days—making it much easier, and much less expensive, for disadvantaged businesses to get up and running quickly.

And we are not tolerating front companies.

Since we consolidated services, more than 30 companies that had been certified by the previous administration have lost their certification because they were not real minority firms doing real work.

Considering the values at stake, we held everyone responsible for the certification process accountable for their actions.

That notion of greater accountability—by managers, by City employees, by all of us—is going to become even more important over the next two years than it has been in the past.

During the last two years, the City's tight finances had all of us looking for things we didn't need to do, or things we could do better.

Cell phones, take-home cars, bad billing practices, travel expenses, and big employee raises were all examined and new policies were adopted.

The atmosphere over the next two years will be even more austere.

With the demands imposed upon the City by the federal and state governments, our budgets are going to be even tighter.

With stocks depressed and leisure and business travel sharply curtailed, our revenues will rise far less sharply than our budget analysts had predicted.

Yet, our real needs – safe neighborhoods, affordable healthcare, good schools, well-maintained roads, recreational opportunities, job training, and new and current business development – will be even greater.

That calculus – less to spend and more to do – means that every one of us will have to do more with fewer resources.

We have sent over a budget that I hope you will read fairly – and pass quickly.

We will have to butcher a few sacred cows, including a popular, but expensive, sick-leave buy-back program.

When you pass this budget, there will be fewer City employees.

But – and this is most important to remember – this budget will allow the City to serve all of its citizens, especially its weakest and poorest residents, better – while allowing the City to continue to invest in economic development so that we can grow our way out of the current budget crunch.

This budget will give City employees the tools they need, better tools than they have now, to get their jobs done.

We share a mandate, given to us by our neighbors, to make this a great City. These first two years have passed quickly.

Two years ago, I said we were at a crossroads: down one path was a great city, and down the other was a city that would never be great.

We are no longer at that crossroads.

We have come a long way down the right road. We have accomplished a lot together.

There is a palpable sense of momentum – and of pride -- in our neighborhoods. Living in the City has never been more popular.

I know, though, that there is still a lot more to do . . . together.

Over the next two years, then, we have these tasks:

1. Safe neighborhoods;
2. More efficient government, doing more with less;
3. Strong and continued assistance to our children and our seniors;
4. Better schools; and
5. Many new seeds of economic growth planted throughout the entire City.

This is an agenda of which we can be proud.

I want to thank you for your careful attention to a long speech.
